

What's in a number?

Dear Friends

Aside from the excellent New Year Ball, our year got off to a flying start with the celebration of Joan Ness's 100th birthday. That was closely followed by the baptism of Caleb Thomas Baxendale who was at the opposite end of the age spectrum – and then, in February, there was my 50th celebration on the first Sunday of the month (a special blessing because I was born on a Sunday). What was even more surprising was to discover that our Trainee Minister, Chris Hay, had celebrated her birthday just the day before; and a dear member of our congregation was celebrating a significant birthday, which also contained a zero, on the Monday!

Over the past few months, I have been reflecting upon the significance of certain dates, not least because I reached 25 years as an Ordained Parish Minister in October of last year. Birthdays, anniversaries and special dates have a way of making us think about our lives and the blessings we must count every day.

When I baptise a child, I am reminded that each day is a special gift from God. When I marry a couple, I like to think that they will have many special anniversaries ahead. When I officiate at a funeral of someone who has lived a long and fulfilling life, I might quote from Psalm 90, verse 12, "So teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom."

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"Life is too short to get caught up in petty squabbles" From a biblical perspective, we are encouraged to number our days, not in a morbid way - but rather to ensure that our days on earth are not wasted. How often have we heard the phrase, "Life is too short"? It's often repeated because we know it to be true:

Life is too short to get caught up in petty squabbles. Life is too short to bear grudges.

Life is too short to sit around all day.

Life is too short to worry about things which may never happen.

Children's Nursery Rhymes, often convey a deeper truth about life and we find that in the rhyme about Solomon Grundy... Solomon Grundy, born on a Monday, christened on Tuesday, married on Wednesday, took ill on Thursday, grew worse on Friday, died on Saturday, buried on Sunday. That was the end, of Solomon Grundy. Later this year, the world will be marking one-hundred years since the end of the First World War. At these commemorations, many will be reflecting on the tragedy of so many young lives being cut short and so many others who were left maimed and mentally scarred. Whatever our age and stage of life, we do well to number our days and count ourselves fortunate to share in the amazing gift of life.

The Psalmist encourages us to number our days and gain a heart of wisdom, so let me conclude with these wise words from Psalm 139:13-16.

"For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb.

I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well.


My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place,

Café St Clair


