Dear Friends

I write this summer article feeling that summer has not yet really arrived. The last days of April brought snow to Kirkcaldy and the scene outside our windows looked more like Christmas than summer! May arrived and its early days were only a little warmer than the previous month but not enough to discard our winter jackets! It was amusing to notice while shaking hands at the church door that many of our members were still wearing their gloves in readiness for the chilly walk home. Of course we live in hope of warm, bright and sunny days because they are a tonic for body, mind and spirit.

The sun makes the crops grow, the flowers bloom and the birds sing. Around this time of year we are woken with the dawn chorus announcing that a new day has dawned and God has granted us the blessing of a new day with all its promise, all its challenge and all its wonder. Especially in summer days there are opportunities to step back from the hectic pace of daily life. Some will inevitably venture into the garden to cut the grass, tidy the flower beds and dig out the weeds. In the rhythm of that work the mind has time to pause and ponder and reflect. Of course at such times much that flits into the mind is inevitably trivial, random and even unconnected. However, I like to imagine that it is the mind's own way of reorganising itself, sifting out what is unimportant from what is valuable and worthwhile.

While sitting on a garden bench basking in the sunshine we might remember an appointment we might otherwise have forgot, we might recall an important conversation we want to follow-up, we might rediscover a sense of perspective in relation to the things that bring us worry, we might reduce levels of stress that squeeze the joy out of life.

In worship, we sometimes sing Psalm 113 verse 3, "From the rising of the sun unto the going down of the same the LORD'S name is to be praised." It is a timely reminder that the first duty God requires of us is also a delight.

From the first ray of sunshine that hits the back of our eye at dawn we can and must praise the name of the Lord. Or in the more eloquent words of Psalm 118, verse 24, "This is the day that the Lord has made; we will rejoice and be glad in it." This affirms the essential goodness of each new day as God's special gift to us (even when the sun doesn't shine!).

Church Census

Scottish Church Census 2015

If you were in Church on 8 May you will be aware that the Census took place during the service. The figures show what we already know; that we are an ageing congregation with only a small number of children although had this taken place on a Messy Church Sunday it would have given a very different picture as there would have been around 35 children and their parents included. However, we have to remember that statistics don't tell us everything because we have a strong congregation of committed Christians who attend Sunday by Sunday. The statistics below reflect the 103 who attending on the day

Disappointingly the wet weather returned on the Sunday, however Alison Davidson brightened our day with a wonderfully thoughtful and uplifting time of reflection. Jelly babies will never quite be the same again! On our arrival at Beamish Open Air Museum, where the Family Social Committee had last visited in 2001, we were back to wet weather clothing and umbrellas. Fortunately, after a short time, the rain eased off and the sun shone for the remainder of the day.

Beamish, 'The Living Museum of the North' continues to fascinate, and is rightly recognised as the North East's Large Visitor Attraction of the Year 2014 & 2015. It's 350 acre site boasts an 1820's Manor House, a 1900's Town, a 1900's Pit Village complete with mine, a 1940's Farm, Tramcars, Horse-drawn Carriages and much, much more. Plans have even been approved to construct a town of the 1950's at a cost of £15M, with the National Lottery pledging £10M. The Beamish Trustees are attempting to raise the remaining £5M, and hopefully the Pathhead visitors will have played their part in boosting the funds necessary to complete this ambitious project. Our five hour visit flew past, however Beamish certainly lived up to it's motto, 'Be Amazed, Be Inspired, Be Part of History.'



Monday morning saw us bid farewell to the Gibside Hotel and its wonderful staff. Our journey north through Border country let us stop off at Peebles for a lovely soup and sandwich lunch at the Green Tree Hotel, and some free time for shopping.

On our arrival at the Best Western Gibside Hotel, Whickham, near Newcastle late afternoon, we were given a very warm welcome, and such 'Geordie' hospitality continued throughout our weekend stay. Accommodation and facilities were excellent, as were the meals and service overall.

Blue skies and sunshine greeted us on the Saturday morning as we set off for the National Glass Centre, Sunderland some 20 miles away. Part of the University of Sunderland, the Centre, a modern open-plan building of mainly glass and steel construction in the former dockland area, boasts exhibition and demonstration areas, a café and a variety of meeting rooms. Although many enjoyed the facilities on site, others took advantage of the warm sunshine and the walkway linking the Centre with the nearby yachting marina. A glass-blowing demonstration at 12 noon, when the skills of local craftsmen were amply demonstrated, rounded off a most enjoyable and interesting visit.

The afternoon was taken up with a short cruise on the River Wear at Durham on board the MV Prince Bishop, which allowed us to see the sights of this bustling university town from a slightly different perspective, particularly the Cathedral, founded in AD1093. The remainder of our time in Durham afforded the opportunity to engage in some retail therapy, although others simply took advantage of the many coffee shops and cafes on offer.

Those who were on the trip are well aware that we had one (or maybe more than one!) of our own angels with us, and a brief stop at the world famous 'Angel of the North' at Gateshead, (erected in 1998 on the site of former colliery pithead baths), on our return journey to our hotel, was a very appropriate way to end our day.

At the beginning of April,


trees have been trimmed, fences repaired and painted, grass cut and flower seeds sown.
