


A Letter From The Manse

Dear Friends

For sure, we are living through strange times. For now, the normal routines of life are not quite what they used to be. We are still having to live with certain limitations placed upon us. In the life of the Kirk (as you will read in this edition) this has involved the difficult decision not to hold a Christmas Fair and a New Year Ball. If we obtain permission from the Health Visitors, we still plan to have a Gift Service linked with the annual UNICEF Appeal but the Jars of Grace will have to take a different format. Apart from the fact that most of us are no longer using small coins on a day-to-day basis, we must adapt to the new realities presented by COVID. So, this year the annual Jars of Grace appeal will be in the form of a special envelope collection which we hope everyone will support just as fully.



Much of this year has been learning to adapt to changed circumstances and this is true for our own Presbytery which has now been linked with St. Andrews and Dunfermline to become the Presbytery of Fife. Frightening national statistics made one of its first tasks a difficult once. From 1st June 2021 vacancies and readjustments processed may proceed only with approval of both Presbytery and the Faith Nurture Forum and will be subject to being classified as "Reviewable Charges". All current Presbytery Plans are suspended while every Presbytery seeks to reduce its ministry posts. Fife Presbytery has been allocated a total of 44.5 Full Time Equivalent ministry posts. These posts can be a combination of Ministers of Word & Sacrament and Ministries Development Staff (including Deacons). This new allocated number is a reduction from our current planned number of 55.5, and an historic allocated number of 68.1 in 2011.

A similar review is taking place with regard to Church buildings. A decision made at the General Assembly means that all buildings within Presbyteries are being reviewed with the aim of having only buildings which are well-equipped, in the right place and fit for mission in the 21st century. Understandably, this will lead to uncertainty for all congregations but taken with the understanding that the status quo was no longer possible or desirable.

While all this adjustment is taking place, there is still much to be done in serving the Lord in our parish and beyond. Recently, I had the pleasure of congratulating the Guild on reaching its 125th anniversary and soon the minds of the Kirk Session will turn its attention to celebrating the bicentenary of our congregation in 2023.

In the meantime, thank you for your continued support of our church and its many forms of mission, service and outreach. May God keep you safe as we move from autumn to winter celebrations and the birth of the One who changed our world forever.

Christmas Fair

At a recent Session Meeting, there was a full discussion around holding a Christmas Fair of some description this year. Different possibilities were discussed but after taking all opinions into consideration, it was the decision of the Kirk Session that there should not be a Fair this year.

Sunday 5 December (2nd in Advent)

Pathhead Outreach

During the lockdown delivery of freshly cooked meals to the elderly and housebound in our Parish has continued. The Outreach Management team have been extremely grateful to the staff and volunteers who have continued to carry out this important work throughout the pandemic.

Earlier this year, with the easing of restrictions, the decision was taken to reopen the Café St Clair on 7th September. The return of customers has been slow and some days have been very quiet. The café is an important part of the Pathhead's mission and it is a safe place where good food and fellowship can be enjoyed.

If you have never come along yourself to the café, please consider giving it a try. If you are already a customer, it would be good if you encouraged friends, family and neighbours to enjoy the good food on offer. The café is open Tuesday to Friday 12 - 2pm. There is something to





suit everyone, tea or coffee with a scone or chocolate

brownie, soup and a roll, filled rolls or meals and

desserts. Half portions are also available on most main courses.

Life Afloat from 'Paws4Thought'

Since last writing for the magazine, life on the canals has changed, as so many other things have, because of Covid. The cruising season of 2020was much shorter because the canals were closed during lockdown and the only movements were made by 'continuous cruisers', these boats have no set mooring, going for water, emptying their toilets and to get fuel. They then had to return to the mooring they were on when lockdown was declared. I had arrived at the marina on the Sunday but had to return to the house 2 days later.

When we eventually were allowed back on board, we had decided to not go too far but to enjoy what was left of the summer. Birmingham was very quiet which in August is most unusual. This city, at the heart of the canal system, sits on a high plateau and has more miles of canal than Venice. The scenery varies from tower blocks to open country but usually with the railway alongside the canal. Travelling the long 'mainline' which takes about 5 hours, we did not pass a single boat – most unusual. This year was very different with so many people on 'staycations' hiring boats, mooring was very difficult in the most popular places.

All the waterway festivals were cancelled last year so we did not manage to see many of our boating friends. This year things took off again and we were at three festivals in four weeks. As members of the 'Boaters Christian Fellowship' (B.C.F.), we help to man the stall and it was possible to allow people on board 'Paws' to see what a modern narrowboat looks like inside.



The end of this season was at Foxeley on the outskirts of Tamworth for a weekend of fellowship and worship with the B.C.F. This was a wonderful way to finish two very challenging years. B.C.F. hope to have a mission in Milton Keynes next June and we have already committed to helping.

Over the past eight summers, we have met many interesting and friendly people on the waterways and have visited many various places of worship from cathedrals like Ely, Gloucester and Worcester to a service in a Methodist Church where the organist was also the preacher and we had a congregation of 5! At the Nantwich Show three years ago, we met James Martin, the chef, who is an amazing person when dealing with the public. I have photographic evidence that I got a cuddle at the book signing!

I hope this gives you an idea of what we get up to when 'afloat'.

Armistice Poppies



We do not need to worry about our Bible being disconnected because of an unpaid bill. Jesus has already paid the bill, and in full.


