# 200<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

As you will already have read in the letter from Andrew, 2023 is an important year for Pathhead Parish Church as it sees us reach our 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary. An excerpt from the book compiled by John Winter for the 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary reads, "On the 2<sup>nd</sup> November, 1823, the Church bell was ringing for the first time to call the people of Pathhead to the opening of their new Church."

A newspaper report describes the structure as

"...Gothic, surmounted with elegant turrets, having a square tower in front, 68 feet high, niched with embrasures. The whole conveys an idea of respectability to the manufacturing villages of Pathhead and St Clairtoun, and forms an imposing counterpart to the ancient and venerable Castle of Ravensheugh, close by."

In the early hours of Sunday, 15<sup>th</sup> November, 1953 the Church described above which had withstood the changes of time and weather, went on fire. The whole interior was destroyed and there followed years of uncertainty before the service of rededication of the Church as we know it today took place on 30<sup>th</sup> April, 1958.
