

Pathhead Parish Church in Kirkcaldy has a rich history, celebrating its 200th anniversary in 2023/2024. Here's a breakdown of its development:

- **Established in 1823:** The church was founded in 1823 as an independent parish, disjoined from the larger Dysart parish. This act signified a growing population in the Pathhead area.
- **Building Construction (1822):** Interestingly, the church building itself was constructed a year prior to the official establishment of the parish, dating back to 1822.
- **Tudor Gothic Style:** The church building is designed in the Tudor Gothic style, characterized by its rectangular plan, crow-stepped gables (stepped gables with a triangular peak), and pointed-arch windows.
- **United Free Church Connection (1844):** Following the Disruption of the Church of Scotland in 1843, a new congregation formed in Pathhead, aligning with the United Free Church. They built their own church building in 1844.
- **Union and Rebuilding (1929 & 1958):**
 - In 1929, the Church of Scotland and the United Free Church reunited.
 - Pathhead saw the official union of its two congregations – the original Church of Scotland parish (sometimes referred to as Pathhead East) and the former United Free Church (Pathhead West) – in 1943.
 - Sadly, a fire damaged the United Free Church building in 1958. This led to the decision to rebuild and expand the existing Church of Scotland building to accommodate the united congregation.
- **Present Day:**
 - Today, Pathhead Parish Church stands as a testament to the area's religious history and the evolution of the Church of Scotland.
 - The church continues to be an active place of worship, offering services, fellowship activities, and events for the local community.
